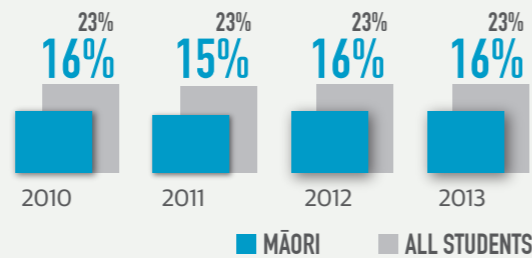
WE HAVE SEEN IMPROVEMENTS AT BACHELOR LEVEL, 27% OF MĀORI STUDENTS WERE ENROLLED IN BACHELOR DEGREES OR HIGHER IN 2013 UP FROM 22% IN 2008

A SIGNIFICANT PROPORTION OF STUDENTS ARE STUDYING AT LOWER LEVELS (NZQF 1-3), HOWEVER MANY DO NOT COMPLETE A QUALIFICATION

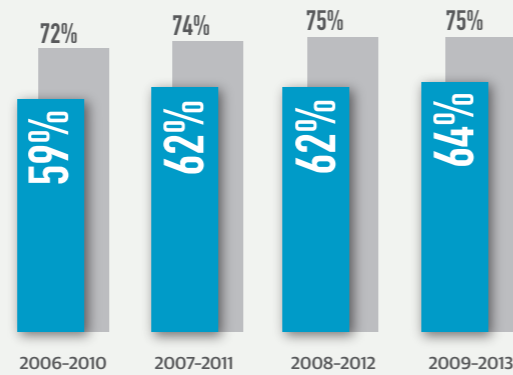

- Improvements continue to be made in qualification attainment for NZQF level 4 and above.
- These improvements provide a strong foundation for further growth in Māori students' participation and achievement.
- Overall participation in Tertiary education continues to rise. However participation for under 25-year-olds remains static.
- There is still much more to be done.
- *Ka Hikitia - Accelerating Success* aims to support Māori students' in achieving and participating at or above the level of the total population.

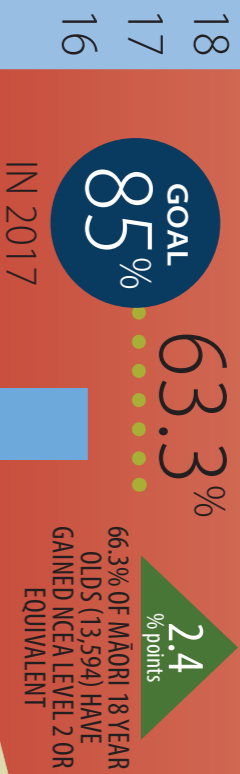


MĀORI EDUCATION PROFILE 2012-2013

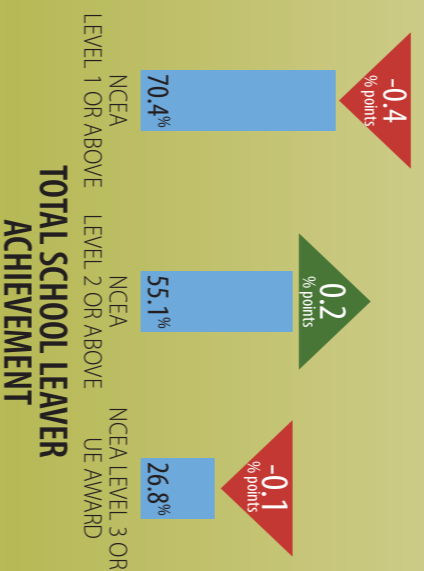
PROPORTION OF MĀORI 18 YEAR OLDS WITH NCEA LEVEL 2 OR EQUIVALENT QUALIFICATION

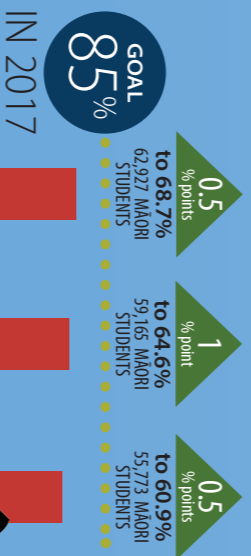


SECONDARY 2013 QUALIFIED LEAVERS WITH NCEA QUALIFICATIONS

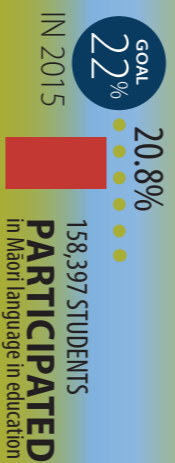


PRIMARY 2013 ACHIEVEMENT AT OR ABOVE NATIONAL STANDARDS

REPORTED NUMBERS BASED ON 2,007 OUT OF 2,099 SCHOOLS

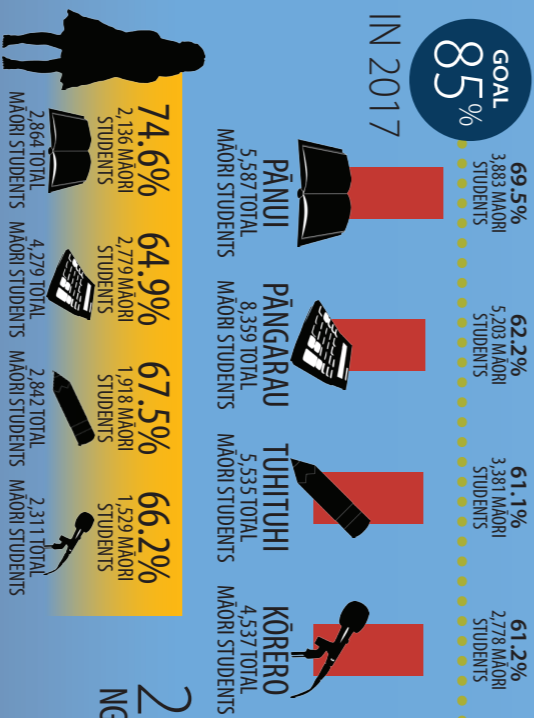


PRIMARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOL STUDENTS
